Membership Corner

If you're still looking for a job, now is a great time to assess some of your job hunting techniques. It is always a good idea to take a step back every once in a while to confirm that you're on the right track and doing all the right things.





The most important thing is to stay optimistic and motivated. In addition to maintaining that positive outlook, here are some simple ways to stay on the right track:

- 1. Get the Skills You Need. Are you finding that you are not qualified for jobs that you are applying for because you don't have the right skills or educational background? Now may be a good time to consider looking at furthering your education. Don't forget the possibility of WIA funding through CareerLink® and options such as schools, from traditional to online, that can offer you the flexibility that you need to get educated, get more interviews and secure that job you have always wanted.
- 2. Keep Practicing. You might think that going on several interviews for different jobs might be a bad sign, but actually, the more interviews you go on, the more practice you get and the more opportunities you have to refine your interview techniques. So stick with it. Every interview will be a learning experience that you can apply to your next interview.
- 3. Seek Out the Help of Friends. Ask a few of your closest friends or family members for some honest feedback on your interview techniques or to review your resume. Friends and family have your best interest in mind and will provide honest feedback. They also have their own experiences to share of what works and what doesn't. Also, don't forget to utilize your LVP contacts throughout your job search to provide you with advice along the way.
- 4. Be an Informed Job Seeker. When interviewing with a potential employer, don't just talk about yourself. It may sound crazy, but instead of just tooting your own horn, research the company by reviewing their latest press releases or reading to find out the latest news about the company through industry magazines so that you can be knowledgeable and ask more specific questions. You can also demonstrate your value by explaining how you can help their company with a specific product or area of their business.
- 5. Reassess Your Job Alerts. Automated job alerts are a must job search tool to ensure that you're not missing out on any great job opportunities. Now that you are in the process of reevaluating your job search you may also want to reevaluate your job alerts to confirm that they are yielding the best possible results. Make certain that you are targeting only the types of jobs you really want. Modify your alerts or set up new alerts to be automatically alerted of opportunities that truly match your job search criteria via email.

Tips and Tricks -

Why does my keyboard have a key with the MS Windows logo?



Seems a bit silly to dedicate a whole key (or two) just as a substitute for clicking on the "Start" button, right? Well, that key is rather handy, actually. It works like your <Ctrl> or <Alt> keys inasmuch as combining the <Windows> key with other keys will produce a neat result. Let's examine some of the clever shortcuts using the often neglected <Windows> key...

- <Windows> plus <E> = Launches Windows Explorer (my favorite!)
- <Windows> plus <D> = Shows Windows Desktop
- <Windows> plus <R> = Launches the "Run" dialog
- <Windows> plus <F> = Launches "Search" dialog (think "F" for "Find")
- <Windows> plus <L> = Locks workstation
- <Windows> plus <Pause> = Launches "System Properties" dialog (this will impress your geekiest of friends!)

NOTE: The function (or lack thereof) of <Windows> key combinations not listed above will vary between different versions of MS Windows. Thankfully, there is no pre-designated key combination that will immediately erase your hard drive. From Your PA CareerLink® Lehigh Valley Connection



Another successful Raymond E. Spencer PA CareerLink® Lehigh Valley Job Fair was held on September 19th and touted The New Look of Manu-

facturing. Billboards, cable television ads (though Viamedia), WFMZ Channel 69 News ads, cable weather crawl ad, newspaper ads (Morning Call, Express-Time, Reading Eagle, and Times News), Hola radio spots, RCN Community Bulletin board, and various online events calendars touted the event that drew 3,909 job seekers. We had 85 employers (included in this number were some training providers, many of whom also had job openings they shared). Employers in attendance were looking to fill over 3,971 job openings, many with professional level positions.



Each year members of the Society for Human Resource Management (SHRM) critique resumes. Thank you to LVP Active and Alumni Members Linda Martin, Debby Mayberry, Deborah Thompson, Susan Roberts, Lori Ofner, Anthony Pawlowski, Marlene Ruby, Michael Scheerer, Jeffrey Scheck, Kathy Savage, and Jane Touchtone and SHRM members who critiqued resumes. We assisted 298 individuals with that service.

This year we held workshops as well which included: Unemployment Compensation, Using LinkedIn in Your Job Search (thank you LVP member and presenter Joe Wolfe for a job well done), The New Look of Manufacturing, and Career Pathways for Advanced Manufacturing.

Additional thank you to LVP members Ruben Saenz de Viteri, Bimo Sunupoernomo, Marlene Ruby, and Marylou Simmons who volunteered in our computer area, escorted employers to their booths, and handled the workshop area. Thank you to all the LVP members who gave their time to see the LVP booth had coverage all day. Results so far have yielded 6 new members and more to follow due to having a LVP booth at our job fair.

I have received positive feedback that job seekers and employers alike were pleased with the event and the good news of hires will be made. Good luck to all who attended.

How I Landed

Hello All,

I've landed after a record setting journey. I will be working as an SAP Analyst at an international company located within 2 miles of my home. This will be even closer than the 3 mile commute that I had for over 20 years.

Newspaper ads by my employer were first brought to my attention 2-3 months ago at Right Management. I applied for one job and was approached about a different, but similar job, two months after applying.

My journey began in early 2009, when I went out the door at LSI along with 10% of the workforce that year. With a long career in software development for the semiconductor industry, I decided to stay in the region. I built upon my software background to transition into information systems by acquiring an MSIS (Master Science Information Systems) at DeSales University.

I paid for the first class. I then obtained funding from the following for which I am thankful: WIA (Workforce Investment Act), ARAA (Stimulus Plan), and finally TAA/TRA (Trade Act). TAA/TRA only became an option after Congress amended the act in spring 2009 to cover non-manufacturing industries and jobs lost to India and China.

I gained CRM and other IS/IT experience on WDIY's IS committee and did a five month contract after graduation in May 2011 as a Data Analyst, utilizing Microsoft Access to analyze the health and vitality of the arts in 3100 counties across 13 demographic groups.

Important keys to my search:

- ▶ Understand your strengths and build upon them,
- ► Maintain a positive attitude by getting out and connecting with people,
- ► Volunteer to keep active,
- ➤ Seek knowledge (for your career and job search) through education, webinars, internet, books, professional organizations, and resources like LV Professionals, CareerLink®, and Right Management (if you get outplacement service),
- ► Recognize every opportunity as a networking opportunity.

The IS IT Focus Group was valuable in gaining additional insights to interpreting jobs in the field, aligning my interest to well matched positions, staying connected with opportunities and education. Thanks to everyone on the committee and to LVP.
